■ Which of your service endeavors had the most significant impact on your school or community?

The Broadway star, Ethel Barrymore, once stated, "For an actress to be a success, she must have the face of a Venus, the brains of a Minerva, the grace of Terpsichore, the memory of a MaCaulay, the figure of Juno, and the hide of a rhinoceros." While this might be true of an actress, I also wholeheartedly believe these qualities are a necessity for anyone to be successful. Thus, in the summer of 2006 and 2007, I developed and taught a drama class at the Miami Rescue Mission's Community Activity Center (CAC) in which I attempted to impart all of these attributes to the children living in the homeless shelter and other youth from the inner-city. Living in a suburb my whole life, I did not realize how important the activity center was to this particular community. In a place were crime and drugs are just as common as the streetlights, the community activity center is an alternative for the children and adults to keep out of the streets and do something constructive. Through my care and knowledge, I was diminishing the chance of them becoming involved in the wrong things and building in them traits necessary for them to persevere, even in the midst of difficult circumstances, and thus, developing "the hide of a rhinoceros."

■ Who benefited from your service project?

Whenever one is giving back to their community, the list of benefactors is almost endless, because one good deed resonates and expands. For example, my work at the Community Activity Center benefited the parents of the children who were at work and could not afford to pay for child care; the minimal staff at the Miami Rescue Mission who were grateful for my consistent, helping hand; the children who had one more entertainer they could drive crazy and more importantly, one more mentor to look up to; and of course the community, which is deeply impacted whenever someone gives of their time and talent simply to brighten the lives of other people. Theatre instills priceless qualities such as determination, leadership, teamwork, and confidence, and these qualities can be used in every aspect of life. The students I work with all have the chance to develop these characteristics and can carry them through in everything they do.

■ Why was this effort so important to you?

The arts, and more specifically drama, has been my engine through life, a source of self-confidence to tackle any obstacle I might encounter. When I first asked my students, "What does drama or theatre mean," I heard "I don't know." An inaudible collection of mumbles from most of the children gave me a magnificent sense of purpose. I felt like I was about to feed a hunger these children never knew they had. I had the privilege and priceless opportunity of introducing a world of creativity and imagination to these campers. I was so excited to inspire and bring out performers. If I ignited the desire in just one out of the hundreds of students I worked with, my goal would be fulfilled. I soon came to realize the teaching process worked both ways. While I was teaching the children, the children were teaching me as well. I observed and studied their art making process, watched which teaching techniques were most effective, and admired their fresh, brilliant perspective. Every time I heard, "Ms. Mimi, is this how you do the mime wall," my heart would melt.

■ Describe the full extent of your role with this effort.

The wonderful thing about working at this free summer program was because my role was not limited to just "teacher". I was a lunch lady helping to serve the children there afternoon meal, a chaperone on field trips, and most importantly, a friend. The campers, ranging from ages 5-16, felt comfortable with me because of my age, and thus I was more easily able to introduce them to the joy of theatre. Since they were not intimidated, many of my students would talk to me throughout the day, ask me questions, and best of all, inquire about performance opportunities. In the two months I had with these children each summer, I tried to give them as much of the theatre as possible. I started with movement exercises than gradually made my way into story telling, improvisation and scene study. Meanwhile I tried to incorporate as much of the history and technical aspects of theatre as possible, through costuming, and brief explanations of the origins of theatre.

Major Project Description, cont.

■ How did you become involved and how did you structure your participation?

I attended an orientation meeting for potential volunteers of the Miami Rescue Mission, and while watching the welcome video, I remember admiring the various activities they had for the youth and adults like cooking, movie night, and sports. However, I also noticed there was no drama program. Thus, near the end of my tenth grade year, I decided to call the Miami Rescue Mission and ask if I could teach a drama class as part of their summer program. To my surprise, they immediately said yes; I was told all I had to do was show up everyday and promise my commitment and dedication. So it was just that simple, I became a teacher within the span of our conversation. The first thing I did was create a lesson plan for every day. Since I was going to be working with ten different groups, three each day, composed of children from many age groups, I tried to tailor the activities to their particular likes and needs. For example, the younger children created their own masks and were taught the history of masks in the theatre. The older kids, however, played improvisation games and did scene work. In the beginning, many of my lessons involved activities my drama teacher did with me at school, but as time progressed, I started creating my own activities. One thing all of my classes did was pantomime, technique and makeup. In addition, in the beginning, all of the groups engaged in a series of activities which helped familiarize the students with each other, with the goal of creating a comfortable performance space.

■ If any, what obstacles have you had to overcome in order to participate or lead this service project?

When I look back at my experience, many things hampered my participation. First, I had to find transportation each and every morning from Aventura to Overtown and then back home every afternoon. On a more meaningful level, I blindly thrust myself into an area in which I was very inexperienced. I never taught or even dealt with children before. So, of course, I was under a lot of stress. Since most of the children didn't even know what drama was, they were very apprehensive and even uncooperative at first. It was difficult to get everyone to open up and try new things, and some of the campers did not want to listen or participate. When I played music from Broadway musicals, they hated it! When we put mime makeup on, the younger boys did not want to look "girly". Additionally, a few times, when I returned to my room in the morning, it had been vandalized; somebody wrote mean things on the board, ripped things and stole materials. There were many times I wanted to cry, many times where I felt that I would not even be able to finish the summer, much less inspire my students' love of drama. However, no matter how many times I wanted to cry or quit from the hours of frustration, that one student who said "Ms. Mimi, when can we practice for the show," made it all worthwhile. When I walked into the gym during recess to discover a cluster of 8 year olds' doing the pantomime I had taught them earlier, it made me forget my struggles. Finally, when children came to me and told stories about how they ended up living in the shelter, their father had been missing, or their parents constantly telling them they are unwanted children, I knew I was there for a reason.

■ What was the impact or outcome of this endeavor from a community or school perspective?

In recent years, there has been a significant decrease on the emphasis of arts and culture in Miami-Dade County Public Schools. I knew I needed to play a role in reversing this downward spiral. A true artist is not one who is simply talented and performs, but one who also imparts her love of theatre to those around her and uses her abilities to help others gain intelligence, grace, presence, and determination. Through my efforts, I was able to inspire the desire of performance; more than that, I was able to give the students I taught something to aspire to, skills to help them achieve success, and even a distraction from a life of hardship. The gift of theatre is like a family heirloom which must be protected and passed down to future generations. Who will continue to pass down the gift if my fellow actors and I don't work to convey our passion for theatre to others? That is why I believe mentoring and working with other people is such an integral part of the arts. The arts bring joy, pleasure, and culture to every community. It is what gives every day of life that extra pizzazz. The arts inspire, move, and shape the world and thus every community must be exposed and experience art in every form.

■ What do you envision as the impact your project will make in the future, if any, and how is it sustainable?

On the last day of camp, the dance and drama classes performed in a showcase. At the end of each summer, there were pantomimes, scenes, and sketches. At the age of 16, I felt like a proud parent when my students performed. To see these students, who at first were so uncomfortable with performing and expressing themselves, showcase their own work was amazing. They created the art; I just polished and fine-tuned it. I discovered I was more like the key that opened their eyes to theatre and released talent that they didn't even know was there. Each student was like a treasure chest; however, I had to yank, pull, and scream before I could admire and enjoy the jewels inside. I don't know if any of the students I taught will continue to pursue drama, but they were exposed to something they may have otherwise never known. The skills they learned through the theatre, such as cooperation, leadership, and confidence will help the students in school and in turn affect their community. Fortunately, the drama class at the Miami Rescue Mission will continue because I have recruited the assistance of my younger peers in our school's magnet program. My hope is that they will receive the same amount of satisfaction and insight that I have experienced as they give of themselves by sharing their talents and abilities.

Ladies and Gentlemen.

My name is Sonise Carri and as the Program Coordinator for Communities in School of Miami Inc at the Miami Rescue Mission I have had the privilege of working with Maria Davila (Mimi) for the past two years. She has motivated and encouraged our students in a most enthusiastic way (using drama). As she interacted with the students most of them learned a skill that was hidden and fell in love with drama and Mimi, she is a positive and charming young lady.

Maria (Mimi) has spent a total of 420 hours for two summers 2006/2007 at the Miami Rescue Mission Community Activity Center. Every activity in which Mimi participates is highlighted by her outstanding creativity. When she first came to the center she stated that she would like to teach drama to our young clients ranging in age four to fifteen. Realizing that this could not be done without lesson plans, she immediately sat down, notebook in hand, and began to plan detailed daily activities. Aware that many of her students would be very young she knew that it would be necessary for them to have fun; therefore, she began by teaching the art of pantomime which allowed them to take their imaginations to far away places. She brought scarves, tutus, boas, different types of hats, gloves, and other items so that they would be inspired to create their own costumes and character. Eventually Mimi had the children write stories, produce, and star in them. She taught them movement exercises in order for them to feel comfortable when they appeared before others. This skill will be valuable when they return to school. Near the end of the program the children spent many hours preparing for the culminating activity an end of the summer showcase. Mimi did an excellent job of preparing the children for this event which was attended by local and state officials who are responsible for funding all the activities at the Mission. As a personal note I would like to say that due to Mimi's dedication and hard work this was happiest and most fulfilling summer that her students have ever experienced.

There is no doubt in my mind that Mimi will be a success at all that she attempts throughout life. Her character is excellent and the children and the staff dearly love her. 

We have remained commercial-free for 26 years and depend on volunteers like Maria to help make this event possible. For our 26th Strut, we wanted to bring young strutters into the fold. We invited Maria and her friend, Laura, to join our parade after seeing their YouTube hit *Chongalicious*, a spoof of the very popular pop song *Fergilicious*. They made us laugh and we knew they belonged with us.

After meeting Maria, the organizing committee was so impressed with her intelligence, sharp wit and charisma, that we decided that both girls should be the Grand Marshals of the 26th Annual King Mango Strut - without having met Laura! We decided that Maria represented the spirit of the King Mango Strut and everything that is right with young people today. Maria continued to impress us and show us what kind of person she is throughout the months of planning and organizing for the Strut. At our KMS Kick-Off Party, for example, Maria and Laura performed for over an hour (we only expected one song), which showed us their dedication and commitment to the Strut. By the end of the evening, those persons "not-in-the-know" about the Chongalicious Girls were then lined up wanting their pictures and autographs for more than another hour. Mimi and Laura have been featured on page one of the Miami Herald and on the national Univision newscast. And two weeks ago, the pair danced with Michael Krop Senior High principal Matthew Welker in front of their school's entire student body. The "Chongalicious Girls," who became local celebrities following the spoof of the song Fergalicious, will be grand marshals of the 26th King Mango Strut parade.



She wears ridiculously large hoop earrings, large enough to be bracelets, which are usually gold and have their name written in them, and diamond studs high up on her ears."

The high school seniors' YouTube.com video Chongalicious has attracted 1.7 million views over seven months and in May was the most requested song on WPOW-FM (96.5).

A tongue-in-cheek video by two Aventura teens spoofing a dress style has become a hit on the airwaves and cyberspace.

The magic starts with a heaping glob of electric blue L.A. Looks hair gel.

Then comes the extra coating of \$1.07 Beauty Glamorous Extra Hold hair

So begins the transformation of 17-year-olds Mimi Davila and Laura Di Lorenzo from your typical T-shirtand-jeans-wearing high school juniors to chongas. Not just your typical chongas; they are "The Chongali-cious Girls" whose song recorded as an antidote to boredom is becoming a runaway hit on the airwaves and cyberspace.

What started out as a homemade music video shot requested

"Memoirs of a Drama Student" A series of unrelated events, that offer a glimpse into who I am

Series 1: When I was first selected to be a part of the mime troupe in ninth grade, I was everything but thrilled. To me mimes were in the same category as freaky clowns and cheap Santa Claus's that gave children nightmares. Even though I was very tempted to quit, I decided to stick around. Sticking around was one of the best decisions I made, mime has furthered me as an artist in more ways than one. I realized through my training, that expressing your thoughts and feelings through movement, is one of the most powerful abilities a performer can have. Through my four years at high school I was able to exercise these "abilities" through a number of community service projects. Our mime troupe was called upon to perform at art festivals, book stores, teacher of the year breakfasts, and shows. With each and every experience, my ability to connect with people was enhanced and I was able to begin sensing who would like to be approached and who would not. Doing mime, as with any street performance is tricky, on one side you can light up a crowd but you have to be careful not to cross any personal boundaries. Especially at social functions where some people are bored or grumpy, you as a performer can really have a direct personal influence on that person's facade. Overall, it was a pleasure to change the entire atmosphere of a room into laughs and love with a little pantomime.

Series 2: I never really found the magic in the cliché phrase "anything can happen" until April 31st, 2007. To explain the phenomenon that occurred on this day and the following months, I shall start from the beginning (no surprise there.)

One day as my friend and I were eating lunch we happened to be staring at a group of "chongas". Before I go any further I would like to describe the cultural phenomenon that is the "chonga." In order to imagine an accurate visual of the "chonga", one must combine a "don't mess with me" attitude, with the following central ingredients: one ton of hair gel, one pound of fake jewelry, skin tight clothing, and a thick black outline around the lips and eyes. We decided to create a song about them called "Chongalicious" to the beat of the hit pop song "Fergalicious". I, being the avid movie maker that I am, quickly suggested that we make a music video to our new song. We rummaged through my closet, found some clothes from my "chonga wannabe" days in middle school, and began filming. That same night, April 31st, 2007, I uploaded the video on "Youtube", an internet site where anyone can post their video creation, thinking it would be something to laugh about with just my friends. Little did I know that the whole city of Miami would be laughing along with us.

A few weeks after the original posting, I woke up and heard our song on the radio and after that everything happened like dominoes. I was flooded with messages from different news papers, TV stations all with the intention of getting the scoop on "Chongalicious". Everyone wanted to know, "How did you come up with this?" and "How is the chonga a representation of your generation?" We appeared on the front page of the "New Times", "Miami Herald", the 11:00 News, TV shows, and even performed live. I wondered, "why did we strike such a cord in Miami, why is everyone so interested?" I mean I knew the video is funny and a very accurate portrayal of "chongas", but why is it getting all of this media attention? Then I realized that these adults are curious about this peculiar culture our generation has created. A culture where boys wear their pants way below their waist, where little girls emulate the style and movement of the women in the music videos, and where drugs, crime, and "pimps" is the main focus of music. I, along with my friend, were the spokespersons for my peers.

It might seem crazy that we made a social and artistic statement by accident. But this experience has taught me that each individual has the power to make a point, and that each individual has the power to alter and shape their society. This is information that my generation can use to their advantage, especially with the technology available to us. It may seem cheesy, but I feel it is my duty to let my peers know, "Anything can happen"-really.
